#### Secretary's Report Board Meeting – February 6, 2017

Dave Brearley called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Present were Mike Kalscheur, Rich Rossio, Bruce Kinney, Lee Nye, Ed Buhot, Mark Wieting, Bert LeLoup, Mike Perry, Howard Peterson, Rick Ogren, and Jerry Johnson. Reminder: Any club member is invited to attend board meeting

The January minutes and treasurer's report were approved. Lee proposed reducing the amount of detail to be presented to the general meeting. The board approved as more detail is always available at the board meetings to which members are always invited. Lee also said the audit was nearly complete and things looked fine. He complimented Mike on the amount of detail contained in new member signup data as that had been a recommendation for improvement in past audits. The board added its thanks as well. Bruce Kinney, Tom Perry, and Bill Schwartz make up the committee.

### **Committee Reports**

Membership – Membership has reached 180 per Mike. At the current time there are 34 members who have not renewed their membership for 2017.

Prizes – Bruce reported that door prizes are in hand for February and March. The committee has continued to increase the value of the door prizes. L & R Collectibles contributed a large assortment of Abranet material for one February door prize.

Publicity – Mark will prepare a note on the club video for submission to the Suburban Life paper.

Toys – A brief discussion centered on the need for a lead person for the toy program.

From Our Workshop – Howard requested feedback on how the FOW segment went in January. General comments were very favorable. It was suggested he might want to show the prizes at the beginning of the segment. He also plays an important role in time management for the first half of the meeting.

Activities – Rich and Mark have a shop visit scheduled for February 11. Dave Pepalis will host.

Programs – For February, Rich has Dave Pepalis ready to speak on jigs and fixtures he created to help with his guitarmaking hobby. A representative of ZAR finishes will speak in March. audio portion of the A/V improved after our acquisition of upgraded equipment. The board authorized expenditure up to \$700 for the A/V committee working with Peter.

-Mike Perry received congratulations from the board for the audio/visual portion of the January meeting.

-The club video has received well over 200 views on You Tube. Unfortunately it has generated a few negative comments about the lack of safety equipment in the table saw segment. While that is commonly done in instructional videos as well as in many shops the board decided that the video will need to be modified to add the recommended safety items to equipment. Although many people use a table saw without a riving knife and/or blade guard, it is not something the club can endorse even implicitly. Mark will analyze the various alternatives and will facilitate the adjustments.

-Discussion of the proposal to use email addresses that wouldn't change with changes in the office holders led to a decision to continue with it for the president but not the other office holders. With the exception of the Membership Chair the volume of email did not warrant the extra work of setting it up and transferring the owner each year. Mike, the current membership chair, preferred to continue the existing process.

-The Greeter trial went well at the January meeting and Ed will serve in February. He will start the evening at the name tag table to assure that the guests receive a name tag.

#### **New Business**

-An idea to modify the club work bench to hold audio/visual equipment was discussed and, after hearing several horror stories about theft in very secure locations, it was turned down.

-A discussion on removing the "commission work & member specialties" was deferred.

# Programs

#### Stairs and school of woodworking explained

At the club's January meeting, David Coulthard discussed his new Midwest Woodworking School and his "day job," building custom stairs in residences in Chicago and the suburbs.

A woodworker even before he became an apprentice at age 16, Coulthard has spent his life working in wood and has several certificates and designations to show for it. Yet, he says, "There is so much in woodworking. I learn things all the time. You can never know it all."

Holding up a copy of *A Treatise on Stairbuilding and Handrailing*, the "Bible" of stair builders, he said the section on the geometry of curving handrails and staircases challenges even math majors. And the book was written in 1900! He brought a sample staircase—four steps high, cut in cross section—to demonstrate the relationship between treads and risers and how they are joined. He said precision is extremely important: "If you are off on the risers by 1/16<sup>th</sup> of an inch, and you have 18 risers, you're off by more than an inch when you get to the top. That's a real problem." He said in one project he built, the risers measured 7 31/32nds inches. "You lose money when you make mistakes so you have to get it right the first time."

He showed photos of a class at his Midwest Woodworking School in Des Plaines, which offers classes for beginners to more advanced woodworkers, emphasizing hand tools. His partner, Douglas Ward, also spoke and invited club members to come by the school and to consider what courses would be of interest, or what courses club members might be interested in teaching.

Coulthard answered numerous questions from the club members, from bending handrails, to where he buys his mill work, to finishing ["I leave that to the floor guys or the painters. I do the construction and that's enough!"]

#### Lee Nye's Shop

About <u>25 club members</u> toured club treasurer Lee Nye's Naperville shop on Jan. 29. Lee builds all kinds of things—he showed an arts and crafts coffee table at the January club meeting, plus a stage for American Girl dolls—but his more complicated projects include 17<sup>th</sup> Century furniture, including a Boston block front chest and a Philadelphia slant-top secretary desk that grace his home [and which are featured in the new club video]. His shop comprises two rooms in his basement, one dominated by a chop saw and a table saw, fence and extensions, plus a complicated dust-removal system. He has numerous other power and hand tools as well as numerous jigs and other helpers in his construction process, all arranged with the skill of the engineer Lee is. Many of us in attendance took home some great ideas about work flow and such essentials as push sticks that really work. An additional treat was seeing the photos of Lee's wife, Marcia, an accomplished photographer.
