screws of all sizes in labelled glass jars, shelf compartments for sanders and drills and a table mounted router along with many other

needed ( and surplus tools) in other. The tile floor and great lighting make it a good place to escape the ordinary world. Bruce's exquisite jewelry boxes and humidors attest to the craftsmanship

that takes place there as well as the time he spends in the shop.

Bruce became interested in woodworking at age 9 when a neighbor decided to put an addition on his house. Although he wouldn't let Bruce near the power tools, he did let him do a lot of measuring, holding and general "gopher" work which put the woodworking bug in his head. Since that start, Bruce has crafted a wide variety of furniture including the wet bar and bar chairs and a craftsman style display case with glass shelves in his basement den which is decorated with a collection of antique ox yokes and old planes. A 6 car wooden train made from scraps Bruce obtained when he was active building houses for Habitat for Humanity is also displayed.

Bruce is a graduate of Ohio State University where he majored in electrical engineering. After graduation he worked for Illinois Bell Telephone as a manager of network operations until his retirement. In addition to being a self-confessed "computer geek" Bruce and his wife, Carol, enjoy traveling and hiking. He has taken mule rides down the Grand Canyon and in Molokai, Hawaii and is certified as a Master Mule Skinner (probably the only one in the club).

### Board Meeting of February 7, 2011

Bill Hochmuth called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Present were Tom Perry, Bruce Kinney, Whit Anderson, Stan Anderson, Jack Pine, Rick Ogren, Len Swanson, Tom Milleman, Sheldon Abrams, Keith

Rosche, Wayne Maier, and Jerry Johnson. Reminder: Any club member is welcome to attend board meetings.

The minutes of the January meeting and the January treasurer's report were approved.

Wayne has programs lined up through May with speakers from Fine Woodworking and Bosch as well as programs on Shaker boxes and scroll sawing.

Len reported Bruce Kinney hosted a good shop visit on February 5. There are several other activities in the works.

Stan showed another new toy design for 2011. Bill said that to eliminate the need for extensive discussion on what is permissible in the current waiver from the Consumer Products Safety Commission the club will only make toys with no finish and use only hide glue in 2011. Stan pointed out that plywood is allowable as long as there are no exposed edges. Bill is organizing three allday toy work sessions with Wayne, Rick, and Bill each hosting one of the days. Dates will be determined later. Stan was asked to organize the work program for each session.

With the addition of twelve new members, we now have 167 members. To date, 26 members have not paid their 2011 dues and Bruce has sent reminder letters to them. It was noted that the majority of the new members first found out about our club by seeing one of our public library displays. Several more sites were identified for potential displays.

Jack reported on recent publicity activities including an approach from Sears for club members to appear in a video for Craftsman tools, This was turned down to avoid the club appearing to favor one specific tool vendor.

Tony increased the number of tables at the next Wood show from two to four. He has eleven volunteers to staff the activity.

Rick has found a source for club shirts and caps with our logo embroidered on them. He will create a specific proposal for acquisition of items for resale to the club members.

Rick reported progress on the program for hands-on wood projects for kids in grades 1-6. Bill appointed Stan to help develop the proposal further and will add another person after the meeting. If someone would like to help with this please contact Bill, Stan, or Rick.

Whit has completed incorporating comments into the Member Survey and will have it ready to pass out at the February general meeting. Sheldon will help with the distribution. Members not at the meeting will be sent copies.

A business card format for the club has been developed and those in need of cards can fill out a request that Whit will format and Bill will print.

Bill is looking for ideas to expand the Special Interest Group (SIG) idea beyond the Period Furniture SIG.

Bill noted that general meeting attendance as a percent of total members is down. A short discussion followed with the main theme of meeting length; however, since January is a unique month with the change in club leadership it is not likely to be the overriding cause. No conclusion was reached.

The meeting adjourned at 8:47 p.m.




