The minutes and treasurer's report were both approved. Bill has most of the information needed on the move to become a non-profit, 501 (C) 3, organization and is preparing a draft of changes for the constitution. The changes to the constitution will be limited to those necessary to achieve the non-profit status. The next general review will be in 2022.

**President's Communication** – The room where we have been holding the board meeting will not be available in the future. We will be meeting in the large hall which is designated Room 1.

## **Standing Committee Reports**

**Membership** (*Mike Kalscheur*) – One new person joined the ranks of the DuPage Woodworkers bringing the membership to 199. The letters and membership cards for 2022 are being prepared.

**Toys** *(George Rodgers)* – George is planning a toy workshop at Woodcraft for October 2 and will be asking for a show of interest at the general meeting.

**From Our Workshop** *(Lee Nye)* – Our experience with Zoom has shown that the photos showing the item being displayed show up more clearly using the photo rather than trying to capture the physical item live. ### September Meeting The Shaper Origin

At our general meeting on Sept. 20, we are moving toward "normality," with in-person attendance at St. James in Glen Ellyn, but there also will be a Zoom component for those

members who choose not to attend in person. Masks and social distancing will be required of those who attend in person, and we'll have to forego the coffee and cookies during the break in the meeting.

Our speaker will be *Whit Anderson* who will demonstrate the Origin, a handheld but computer guided router from Shaper Tools. Origin is a portable CNC machine that can cut mortise and tenon joints, inlays, intricate parts of various sizes and other jobs demanding precision and repeatability. Whit has been using his device for almost a year, and has cut gears, dadoes, decorative shapes (some to be filled with epoxy) and other pieces. This is a chance to see this device up close, in-person or via Zoom.

There will also be From Our Workshop, both inperson and via Power Point. We've held off on FOW presentations for the last couple of meetings so there is a great list of interesting projects to be shown.

## Using the General 809 Honing Guide



I somehow have two of these. Did not like them initially, but at the MWTCA meet, I acquired an old spoke pointer which has a very thin, short blade, and I had to use

the 809. I couldn't find instructions anywhere on the internet so here is what I learned.

Besides regular blades and chisels, the 809 is useful for sharpening very narrow things like a 1/8" chisel, short blades from a spokeshave, even skewed cutters. On the downside, an 809 hones only a 30 degree bevel. It has a roller foot that rides along the bench instead of on the stone, so the foot has to be reset each time you change to a stone with a different thickness.



There's a flat area on the bottom below the blade clamp. It is thirty degrees to the surface that clamps the blade. Retract the blade so it does not touch

your stone. Loosen the knuckle knob in the center so the foot swings free, and place a business card on the stone under the flat area. Press down firmly on the front of the guide so the flat rests securely on the business card. At the rear, move the foot down so it touches the bench and tighten the knuckle knob.



With the business card still in place under the guide flat, loosen the blade clamp and slide the blade down to touch the stone evenly. Tighten the blade clamp,

remove the business card and commence honing. When you advance to a higher grit, it's likely the stone will not be the same thickness. I have stones ranging from 3/8" to 1". So on each change, repeat the foot setting process - press the flat against business card, loosen knuckle knob, adjust foot



to touch bench, tighten knuckle knob. Only adjust the foot, do **not** change the blade setting.

The stock 809 clamp only works for blades 2 inches or longer. For shorter blades we have to help it. To handle this short cutter from the spoke pointer, I sandwiched the blade with three rulers, one on top



of the blade, one underneath and one a bit thinner than the cutter in the middle. It honed up great and the spoke pointer works like a charm.

### DuPage Woodworkers Activity September 11 - Ron Colliander's Sawmill

Our second group outing in 2021 took us to **Ron Colliander's** home workshop where he demonstrated his 1994 Wood-Mizer. This is a portable sawmill suitable for woodworking hobbyists to full-time sawmill operators. It uses a bandsaw type blade that is positioned for horizontal cuts.

Ron discussed the entire process from obtaining logs to loading logs, prepping them and cutting them into planks. He also discussed the features and operation of the sawmill. Ron then demonstrated how to load a log onto the machine using its hydraulic lifting apparatus and positioning it for cutting. He began the cutting process by making multiple passes as he trimmed the wood to prepare the central part of the log for cutting into planks.
