DuPage Woodworkers Board Meeting February 6, 2023

George Rodgers opened the meeting at 7:00 p.m. Present were Jim Harvey, Bruce Kinney, Jeff Kramer, Howard Peterson, David

Wesolowicz, Bruce Metzdorf, Mike Kalscheur, Harry Trainor, Lee Nye, Tim McAuley, John Zurales and Mark Wieting (by phone).

President's Report:

George noted that our scheduled discussion on our insurance coverage would not be held because our speaker could not be with us. Later he reported on purchasing wood for the toys program and his difficulty in getting the wood back to his house.

Treasurer's Report:

David Wesolowicz reported our combined checking and PayPal accounts totaled approximately \$6,543 at the end of January. The spread sheet he had distributed prior to the meeting includes draft budget figures for each of the line items in Income and Expense.

Standing Committee Reports

Membership (*Mike Kalscheur*) – Mike reported that we have two new members for 210 total. About 85% have renewed for 2023. Those who have not paid by March 1 will be dropped from membership. He also reported that a new member, Craig Gaitan, has extensive experience with Survey Monkey and is willing to assist when we do future surveys.

Library (*Tim McAuley*) – Tim said he's working on the plans to expand our library unit and sought input on whether to make books or DVDs a priority for new purchases. The consensus of the board was to concentrate on books.

Prizes (*Bruce Kinney*) – Bruce reported that because there was no meeting in January, we "broke even." He will carry over the prizes for February. (It was noted that **Feb. 20** is Presidents Day, but the meeting will be held as scheduled.)

Publicity – No report.

Toys (George Rodgers) – George reported that the next

Toys Workshop will be **Saturday**, **Apr. 29** at Woodcraft in Woodridge. *Bruce Metzdorf* noted that some DPWW members might like to make toys that require a band saw or drill press but lack those tools. George volunteered to write a story for the newsletter explaining that we have these tools for use by members, and how to obtain them.

Newsletter (*Jim Harvey*) – Jim set the deadline for material submission as **Friday**, **February 10**.

From Our Workshop (*Lee Nye*) – Lee has prizes in hand for the next two meetings.

Activities/Programs (*Jeff Kramer*) – Jeff noted that the Milwaukee Woodworking show is **Feb. 18**; contact Jeff (**kramer123@hotmail.com**) if you would like to join other members at breakfast at the Mimosa Restaurant in Franklin, WI.

Saturday, Mar. 18 is a shop visit at Ressler Guitars (see www.resslerguitars.com for some amazing guitars) and Ressler Designed Stairs in Sandwich, IL.

The February program will be given by *Bruce Metzdorf:* "A Bowl from a Board." Mar. 20 will have *Tom Monahan* presenting on General Finishes.

A/V (*Howie Peterson*) – No activity.

Web (Bill Hoffman) –John Zurales said the registration for our website is due and he and Bill Hoffman are working on it. Jim Harvey noted he has a complete gallery of FOW projects presented at meetings going back to 2005 that might be valuable to members seeking ideas for their own projects. It could be posted on the website, although he warned it is a very large file that might need to be broken into pieces, perhaps five-year chunks.

Old Business:

Non-Profit Status: George reported the State of Illinois has denied our request to register as a not-for-profit organization (even though the IRS has done so). The only consequence is that we will still be required to pay Illinois sales tax on purchases, such as wheels, axles and wood for doll beds. We will add a notation of our IRS 501(c)(3) status on our website, and *John Zurales* is working on the wording.

George has found a good use for the donations of the Sandwich Fair building models donated by *Ron*



Milford: To be auctioned off this summer as a fund raiser for the Fair.

Zoo Burr Oak: George has had discussions with the Lincoln Park Zoo arborist regarding the very old burr oak tree to be taken down but the 2+ year period for any wood to dry before making items out of it seemed too long for the arborist, who might search for kilns to dry it. George offered her some names but we don't want to take on that challenge.

Constitution and By-Laws review: The board had reviewed Draft 7 of the Constitution. It needs to be voted on by the members, and the board agreed to send all members a copy of the document *Mark Wieting* had prepared that outlines the changes. This will be sent prior to the February meeting, at which discussion and the vote will be held.

New Business:

The discussion of our insurance coverage will be held at the March board meeting.

It has been suggested that we highlight our not-for-profit status on our website and that donations to DPWW are tax-deductible. John and Bill will work on the best ways to highlight our status.

Given the last-minute cancellation of the January meeting, there was a suggestion of creating a list of members' cell phones for text notification if a similar situation occurred in the future. George will attempt to get a sense of those attending the February meeting as to whether they think such a list is a good idea.

The Secretary position on the board is currently vacant so George has reviewed the member roster to identify people who might do a good job and could be approached about taking on the office. If anyone reading these minutes would like to volunteer, please contact *George or Mike Kalscheur*.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:05 pm.


Internet Woodworking Tips of the Month



- 2 2 Sets of 3/8" Socket Wrenches (1 Metric and 1 SAE)


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Book Report

The Wood Sanding Book

In my attempts on woodworking projects over the years, I have not relished the inevitable step of sanding the final pieces prior to assembly or applying the finish. (I have gotten pretty good at cleaning up my brushes after varnishing or painting though.)



This 1997 publication from Tauton Press on Wood Sanding by Sandor Nagyszalanczy seemed to be a good choice to pick up ideas to hone my skills and make it a more enjoyable process.

The book is composed of 8 chapters covering abrasives, sanding to a great finish as well as

tips and methods for using both handheld and freestanding tools. There is a good section on personal protection against dust as well as dust collection devices. There were examples for making a dust collection table and air filter system. Very useful and something within my ability to make.

A discussion of methods to turn a portable belt sander into a stationary type one was helpful. I can now use my portable one in a different application and increase my capabilities.

I didn't read this book from start to finish. After the first few chapters on sanding materials and application, I skipped around to different chapters on tools and methods. This worked best for me and I didn't feel that it caused any disruption to the flow of the book.

Overall, it is a great learning and reference guide for me that will help me on current and future projects.

Stolen From Facebook Department

My shop is in the unheated garage so every December I mothball glue and anything else that might not tolerate freezing, bring it into the house. Come spring the glue is usually unpourable. This is a good idea, I recently picked up a Rival Seal-A-Meal at Goodwill. I will report my successes —*Jim Harvey*





Food vacuum sealers are not just for leftover food. How many times have you used part of a bottle of glue or tube of caulk and wanted to save it for later only to find it has dried up to the point it is useless? Just cut a bag a little oversized and insert that unused glue or caulk and vacuum seal it. This is a bottle of polyurethane glue that I opened four months ago and it was as good as new when I used it again today. Even if you don't have a vacuum sealer you can get them for under \$50 and you will save not only that leftover meatloaf but that pricey glue and caulk too.



January February Meeting

Improved Bandsaw Dust Collection



While bandsaws may not be the most prolific producer of dust in your shop, they do generate enough to be a health hazard and a nuisance. Most bandsaw dust tends to collect under the table on the lower guides and inside the lower wheel guard covers. For the older bandsaws, the dust ports, if equipped at all, are wimpy and wholly inadequate. My older Jet

and Delta 14 inch bandsaws came with 1 inch ports for

a shop vac. This photo is a newer Jet with a 2 inch port - still insufficient in my opinion. In my quest for improvement, I did cut a large hole in the lower wheel cover of my Jet bandsaw and



attached a 4 inch port to the cover (similar to the photo right). This was better but I still found a lot of dust




collecting on the lower guides and even in the lower wheel area.

Some newer model bandsaws are equipped with 4 inch dust ports, but the location and restricted air flow make them less than ideal in my opinion. Clearly the restriction is meant to prevent someone

from poking fingers into the saw for safety. This setup is not good for air flow and some of us would remove the restriction to fix that problem. Even so, I do not expect this rear port would be any more effective than

my front cover port was.

What I do think works better is a large 4 inch port located under the table and in front of the lower guide area. (Yes, the guide bearings are out of adjustment because the blade tension has been released. You mean you don't do that every time??)



The cutout on the lower cover is where the original wimpy port was located. Generally, in the right area,

but too small and too low to be really effective.

My solution to the problem is a modified 4 inch dust hood, with a strap hinge on the lower edge. This allows the port to be



swung down out of the way to tilt the table and change blades. The clear extension is a quick connect to my dust collector hose. I use a spring to hold the port in

place on my Jet bandsaw, but a similar port on my Delta bandsaw just happened to snap in place to a rib on the table.

Using a 4 inch port and connection to a



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dust collector vs the shop vac port provides vastly more air flow and covers the whole lower guide and upper wheel cover area well. I rarely tilt my table, so the dust port is not a

problem to me. If tilt is needed, I would just swing the port down and live with the dust for a while. I have found this setup to work very well in minimizing dust.



My dust port is a modified 4 inch dust hood purchased from Woodcraft.

The photo here shows the hood after I cut it to fit my Jet bandsaw. You may be able to improve on the shape with a bit



more patience. I used some poster board to test the fit before cutting the dust hood. You can see the strap hinge on the top left photo—you will need to drill and

tap for screws to mount the hinge to the bandsaw.

This photo shows the dust hood on my Delta bandsaw - a little different profile than the Jet. Your results may differ for your brand of bandsaw and I would definitely use some cardboard for trial fitting.



One last thought. Use a throat plate with a larger blade opening and maybe some additional holes to maximize suction of dust from the table top. If you are having tearout issues, then substitute a zero-clearance plate.
