

<u>DuPage Woodworkers Board Meeting</u> May 1, 2023

George Rodgers opened the meeting at 7:00 p.m. Present were Bruce Kinney, Howard Peterson, Bruce Metzdorf, Dave Wesolowicz, Harry Trainor, Jim Harvey, George Rodgers, Mark Wieting, Lee Nye, Mike Kalscheur, Bill Hoffman, Steve Young, Joe Berkemeyer

Steve Young was introduced as the new Secretary and members then went around the table introducing themselves for Steve's benefit.



The current meeting's agenda had been received by the members and prior meeting minutes were approved by those present.

President's Report: *George Rodgers* reported that the budget of \$1500 for the toy program has been exhausted. Wood has increased in price. The President also reported that an Oak tree was coming down if anyone was interested. Some suspect the tree is up to 200 years old.

Treasurer's Report: *Dave Wesolowicz* reported a bank balance of approximately \$5,543. While the organization is not in financial trouble, the needle is moving in the wrong direction. It suggested that the annual dues be increased from \$25 to \$30. There has never been an increase in dues since the organization was formed in 1994. A brief discussion followed with the Board approving the increase to \$30 effective October 1, 2023.

Standing Committee Reports

Membership (*Mike Kalscheur*) – The membership increased by two over the last month bring our total to 198. One new member is from Iowa and found us via our website.

Library (*Tim McAuley*) – No report.

Prizes (*Bruce Kinney*) – Prizes for the May meeting will include a plunge router and a set of donated bits. Active attendance at the general meetings seems up. The raffle is on track to equal pre-pandemic levels.

Publicity – No report.

Toys (George Rodgers) – On Saturday, April 29, members donated time to construct toys for our annual program. 100 doll beds and approximately 600 toy cars were assembled. This was done at the Woodcraft store in Woodridge. There was a slight bottleneck with the sander availability.

Newsletter (*Jim Harvey*) – The newsletter is working on a couple of articles for the next issue. One of the articles is on joinery. There was some discussion on

adding a "Toy of the Month" feature. Additional newsletter contributions are welcome.

From Our Workshop (*Lee Nye*) – Lee has three Wixey digital angle gauges for May FOW prizes.

Activities/Programs (*Jeff Kramer*) — An activity to visit Dugan's Wood Products is planned for May. Dugan's is about an hour drive. Additionally, the next members meeting will feature a presentation on Norton Abrasives.

A/V (*Howie Peterson*) – We are working on setting up an AV group.

Web (*Bill Hoffman*) – The classifieds on the website have become busy. A renewal of the club's webhosting service was made for 1 year. We are looking to migrate the web to WordPress. This will be much easier and less time consuming. A general discussion began about the website design and possible changes. Several possibilities will be explored.

The possibility of placing workshop content from April's meeting on the web had been requested by a member. A discussion ensued about copyright law and waiver/releases. More research needs to be done to avoid any issues with materials being posted.

Liability insurance (GR reporting) – Waiting on documents from our agent.

New Business:

A suggestion was made to move our Board meetings back to Zoom. It was agreed that the next Board meeting will be a Zoom meeting.

At approximately 8:00pm the meeting was adjourned.




Toy of the Month

Table Saw Safety with the GRR-Ripper

If you have some extra cash, I recommend purchasing at least one GRR-Ripper. This product not only improves safety in feeding material on your table saw, router table, and bandsaw, I think it improves the quality of the machining as well.

I purchased a pair of grippers a few years ago after experiencing an injury using my table saw. No, I did not contact the blade. I was using a push block that supported the material being fed between the blade and the fence. All seemed very cautious and safe, but it wasn't. The loose cutoff jiggled into the backside of the blade and the piece came rocketing back at me. My left hand was held safely (I thought) away from the material and blade, but the flying cutoff took off most of the nail of my forefinger and resulted in a visit to the emergency room and some stitches. I had seen the GRR-Ripper demonstrated at the Woodworking Shows, but considered it a nuisance to set up and a bit pricey. After the emergency room visit and medical bill, I went to Woodcraft and bought two. The immediate benefit was support and control of both sides of the material feeding through the cut. If I had used the GRR-Ripper, I would have avoided my injury. What I didn't expect was how versatile it is and how much it improved my work.

Here are some GRR-Ripper setups:



Above shows the setup for a standard rip cut of about 1 inch wide. The GRR-Ripper legs (yellow) straddle


the saw blade and the side bracket and bottom plate (black) level the GRR-Ripper and keep the material against the fence for the cut. The bottom plate has a little hook that helps pull the material through the cut.



Photo left shows two GRR-Rippers used in a hand over hand feed for longer stock.

The standard legs can be adjusted to enable a fairly narrow rip cut of around 1/2 inch or so. There is an

optional accessory leg that enables rip cuts as thin as 1/8 inch. It is the green leg on the right side of the GRR-ripper (below left). The wide black leg (with the green knob) should have been moved further right over the stock for better feed and control. The two right legs straddle the blade enabling this very thin



cut with control and precision. By the way, the handle is easily moved so that the downward force is directly over the cut area.

Using the GRR-ripper on the table saw keeps my hands out of harm's way and helps me feed the material steadily through the blade with minimal burning and no worries about kick back.





The GRR-ripper is great for the router table as well (right). It keeps the material tight against the table top and the fence so that profile cuts are clean and uniform.

If you want to see the GRR-ripper in action, just google GRR-Ripper and you will find dozens of YouTube videos of all kinds of applications. You will find some ideas for shop made grippers there too. There is an introductory video on the product on YouTube.


Borrow DPWW Tools


