
Toy of the MonthWhale Toy Crayon Holder

This pattern contributed by *Whit Anderson*, should print full size. This and many other plans are available on the DPWW web site. Do you have a simple wooden toy design you can share with our members? Send to newsletter@dupagewoodworkers.org.

The whale toy crayon holder is made from a 2x4 or other material of the same size. Since the whale is painted, lower quality wood can be used. There will be plywood templates available at our monthly meetings to help draw and position holes on the whale. You can also print and cut out the templates that are at the end of this article. More detailed instructions can be downloaded



from the DPWW site Toy page. Minimum tools needed are sandpaper, a jig saw ,and 3/8 and half inch dril bits preferably in a drill press. Construction will be faster if you have a band saw, spindle sander, and a router with a 1/8" round over bit

Sawmill Attracts 15 From DPWW

Members and their families visited Dugan Wood Products, Inc., in Leland, IL, to see and learn about the sawmill process. Hosted by owner **Dave Dugan** and his son Charles, our group learned that the 48" sawblade is powered by a 50-horsepower electric motor and has replaceable carbide tips in the event they encounter metal in a log being milled. Dave displayed a small section of a log that had metal in it—a ring for tying up a horse back in the day. He said that luckily they had not hit the iron ring while cutting the log—sparks fly when they do hit iron or steel.

The Dugans cut a 12' long Osage Orange for our demonstration of the capabilities of the mill. The log didn't look like much with its bark intact, but inside was some wonderfully orange and brown wood. On the outlot was a 36" diameter Tamarack log 14' long that had been drying in the sun for two months. Tamarack is in the Cedar family and several people guessed "Cedar" when shown a cutting from a similar log. When asked how much the log weighed, Charles said it probably weighed 5,000 lbs. when it was delivered, maybe 4,000 lbs. now. The Dugans use a commercial forklift to move such logs around.



Dave Dugan said they cut logs to sell the wood, and sometimes cut logs for a fee for people who want to retain the wood themselves. The sawblade process differs from the Wood Miser band saw process we saw demonstrated by member Ron Coliander in September '21 of the band saw moving through the wood, the wood moves through the large sawblade. The entire setup requires heavy equipment to move the logs to the mill and the mill itself requires at least 300 sq.ft. Dave said the sawdust generated is vacuumed out of the shop into a wagon outside, and people take it away for horse bedding and other uses. He said Walnut cannot be used for horses, but it can be used for cattle.

It was a great way to spend a bright spring morning learning about wood and the sawmill process.


