Newsletter Editor Wanted - October 2024

I've been the newsletter editor for six years, it's time to pass that torch. If you are at all interested, contact *Mike Kalscheur.* To give you an idea of what's involved, Here is a reprint of a series of articles written by *Bruce Kinney* in 2009. Bruce was a Microsoft person, I use Linux. In the November newsletter, I plan to lay out my work flow creating a newsletter, very similar to Bruce's but different software. – *Jim Harvey*

Newsletter Editor Wanted - Feb 2009

Editors Note: 2009 will be my last term as Editor of the DuPage Woodworkers Newsletter. 5 years is enough. Over the next few months, as space permits, I will describe just what is involved in producing the Newsletter each month. This is done in the hope that someone will come forward to continue publishing the Newsletter.

Production of an issue of the Newsletter begins with the photos taken at the general meeting. For the "From Our Workshop" segment I try to get at least 2 photos of each entry: one depicting the entrant with his or her project and a second closeup shot of the project. This serves several purposes: it associates the project with the entrant, produces a photo of the project which can be modified to show a large image of the project and provides photos for the gallery on the Club web page. I also photograph the program speaker and any other interesting events which occur at the meeting.

Following the general meeting and over the next few days, as time permits, I edit the photos and enter them in the Newsletter. I use 3 photo editing programs to accomplish this. Microsoft Office Photo Manager is used to do bulk editing such as rotate, crop and color correction. Modified photos are saved with a descriptive file name so as to retain the original intact. At this point the photo file size is in the order of 2 Mb and the photo size is huge perhaps 20" or so.

The next step uses Corel Photo Paint to resample the photos down to about 2" in the largest dimension, more suitable for inclusion in the newsletter. The resampled images are saved in the JPG format and compressed to a reasonable file size...about 10 Kb on average.

These images are ready for inserting in the newsletter. Some images are suitable for closeups of projects and PhotoShop elements is used to develop a transparent, cropped image and saved in the GIF format. All the images are saved in a folder named for the new

newsletter. For example, the photos from the January meeting are saved in a folder created for the February newsletter.

At this point the photos are ready for inclusion on page 5 of the Newsletter, but there is no Newsletter to include them on.

To begin the newsletter, I open last month's newsletter and "save as" this months newsletter. The normal newsletter consists of a Microsoft Publisher file. That file has 3 master pages which layout the title page and the left-hand and right-hand pages. These master pages contain the issue number, page number and top and bottom of the page information. This is updated to reflect current information using the "Find and Replace" menu in Publisher.

At this point the only available information is the collection of edited photos and they are inserted onto page 5, resized as appropriate, captioned using the "From Our Workshop" slips entrants prepared at the general meeting, and laid out in a pleasing manner. The goal here is to fill the space on page 5. So few pictures results in big pictures and many photos results in smaller pictures. That's it, page 5, the most time consuming page is done.

At the Board meeting (1st Monday of the month) the deadline for newsletter stuff is set and the treasurer's report is received. This provides information for page 6 which also includes the secretary's report of the Board meeting. That report usually comes within a day or two of the board meeting. A cut and paste on the secretary's report, updating the treasurer's report as well as updating the ClubCalendar finish page 6.

Over the next few days the information from various committees arrives via email and is stored inn the newsletter folder. Standard items include "The Presidents Corner", "Programs", "Activities", "Library Report" and information about guests and coffee hosts. There may also be information about upcoming activities like the

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club auction, Woodworking Show etc. As these are received they are cut and pasted into word documents and saved in that months newsletter folder. As time permits, each of these items is pasted into their appropriate space in the newsletter, formatted and spell checked. Contributors to the newsletter are quite good at meeting the newsletter deadline so, for the most part, little follow-up is needed.

The real challenge is to fit all the information into the 6 pages with little white space. Usually this can be accomplished by adjusting the size of graphics, adding Club logos and adjusting font sizeto make to make it all fit. For the event that there is a large chunk of unfilled space, I maintain a file of woodworking tips which I harvest from various woodworking magazines. It's a simple matter of cut and paste to utilize a tip to fill space. If a whole page can be made blank, it is a simple matter to delete a page. The Activities Committee report generates the data for the Programs & Events section on page 1.

An aside here is photos for the web page. Copies of the unedited photos of projects along with adescription of each photo are assembled in a folderand sent to the webmaster. This is accomplished using a freeware FTP program, FTPCommander, to upload that folder to the newsletter directory on the web page. The web master takes those photos, edits them and puts them on the web page.

At this point, the construction of the newsletter is complete and it now must be distributed. At this point, the construction of the newsletter is complete and it now must be distributed. About 40 copies of the publisher file are printed in gray-scale format on 3 hole punched 20lb copy paper. These are folded and stuffed into preprinted and stamped envelopes.

I use Microsoft Outlook as my email editor and have created a series of distribution lists. Two ofthose lists contain vendors addresses and the addresses of those who receive their newsletters via paper mail. Printing envelopes for these newslettercan occur at any time after the Board meeting.

Outlook also allows me to create a template for the email that announces the availability of the new newsletter. My distribution list for this email consists of 2 distribution lists with about 50 email addresses in each. Gmail is my

choice of email provider and it balks at about 100 bcc (blind carbon copies).

Using a template means I only have to compose one email and send it several times with different addresses. And, the words in the email are basically the same month after month so it is only necessary to make minor changes in that email each month. There are two forms of the templates. One for comped newsletters which does not contain information about the club roster and another that does.

The email version of the newsletter is posted in the web page in PDF format which is readable by anyone using Adobe Reader. I use a freeware program, Primopdf, to convert the Publisher file to PDF format. This process is as simple as opening the Publisher file and printing it to Primopdf. The netresult is a PDF file which is somewhat compressed and ready for uploading to the web site newsletter directory. At the web site, access to the newsletter is obtained by clicking on the proper line on the newsletter page. Clicking that line takes one to a file named LatesDPWnews.pdf, no mater what the date is. Thus, after creating the PDF file, it is re-named LatestDPWnews.pdf and uploaded to the newsletters directory on the newsletter web page using the now familiar FTPcommander, overwriting last months version. A properly named version is also uploaded for the webmaster to install in the archives.

Prior to sending the emails, I test all the links in the email to ensure they have not been broken somewhere in the process. Sending the emails is as simple as opening the template file in Outlook, adding the addresses from the distribution lists and clicking "Send". The final step is to monitor incoming email for rejected emails. These are rejected for a variety of reasons. The most prominent reason is a full mailbox. I ignore these. The second most prominent reason for rejected email is a changed address. These I deal with on a phone call. There are also a number of rejections due to security software which would require me to resend in so many minutes. Recipients have options to eliminate this requirement on a per sender basis so I ignore theseas well. That is it.

Now it's up to one of you to come forward and assume the Newsletter editor job if you wish to have the monthly newsletter continue.



<u>Favorite Shop Tips and Jigs</u> (Additional) – November 2024 Meeting

As a follow-up to the September meeting, any of you who may have missed presenting or have additional presentation topics, we have time for some additional presentations at our November meeting. The November meeting typically has a short program due to the toy exchange. You can have up to five minutes to present your favorite(s).


