

DuPage Woodworkers Board Meeting — January 6, 2025

George Rodgers opened the Zoom meeting at 7:02pm. In Secretary Steve Young's absence, Mark Wieting agreed to draft minutes; Dave Wesolowicz also contributed.

Present were Gordon Brand, Jim

Harvey, Bill Hoffman, Mike Kalscheur, Bruce Metzdorf, Lee Nye, Howard Peterson, Mark Wieting, Dave Wesolowicz.

Agenda Additions, Changes and Approval – No changes were made to the proposed agenda. The Board approved the December 2 meeting minutes.

Treasurer's Report: (*Dave Wesolowicz*) – Dave reported that at year end our cash balance was \$8637. As compared to the previous year, figures for income and expense were similar, except for a jump in donations, resulting from two donations of wood then sold to our members, some individual donations for the food pantry project, members adding donations to their dues payment. Additionally, a \$250 donation from the employees of Excelon was deposited in our account in 2025. The board did not know the genesis of the Excelon donation.

Communications:

Secretary – *George Rodgers* mentioned that Steve and others are attempting to obtain the complete set of back minutes from *Jerry Johnson*. *Mike Kalscheur* mentioned that his membership records go only as far back as 2014 and he would like a more complete set.

President – No report

Standing Committee Reports:

Membership (*Mike Kalscheur*) – Mike reported that we now have 218 total members, and that 80% of member households have paid their dues for 2025. About 40 members have not yet reupped. Mike had sent to the board a list of items suggested for programs and activities he'd gleaned from the dues process responses. There seemed to be an emphasis on basic skills, along with more advanced topics and activities. It was suggested that perhaps basic skills instruction could take place a member's shop.

Library (*Tom Kubica*) – Through George, *Tom Kubica* reported that *Andy Ban* had offered to donate books and magazines, and *Jim Harvey* said he is likely to donate

some books in the near future.

Publicity (*Mark Wieting*) – No activity beyond the successes we had with CBS Channel 2 and WGN Channel 9 covering the toys program.

Prizes (*Bruce Kinney*) – Bruce recounted our shift from offering three prizes to offering two, with a resulting budgeted expense going from \$200 per meeting to \$150. Offering two prizes has gone well but increasing prices of tools is becoming a minor concern. Tools that used to cost \$100 are now \$125 or so, and that squeezes the budget for secondary prizes.

Bruce said he has already purchased prizes for meetings through May, and that the larger prizes are in hand through the end of the year. The prizes for January will be a suite of sanders (random orbital, palm ¼ sheet, and detail), and a fire extinguisher and gooseneck work light.

Toys (*George Rodgers*) – The annual toy collection will occur at the November 17th meeting.

Newsletter (*Jim Harvey*) – Jim will include a link to the Colliander brothers (Ron and Mike) early morning visit with WGN to donate toys to its annual toy drive. He will note the *Rick Ogren* shop visit.

From Our Workshop (*Lee Nye*) – Lee Nye reported he has the prizes for January, safety items for the table saw and planer.

Activities (*Vaibhav Konanur*) — Bruce said there is a shop tour at *Rick Ogren's* shop Jan, 18, from 10 am to 12 noon. There was a plan to attend the Milwaukee Wood Show in February but it appears to have been cancelled. We are looking for alternative activity for February.

Programs (*Bruce Metzdorf*) – Bruce talked about future programs he has scheduled. January: *George Rodgers* on making spline joints. February: *John Zurales* will show Microjig products applied to a specific project.

In addition there was discussion of whether it would be desirable to pay small honoraria to club members who make presentations as a thank you for their efforts. Although that has not been the tradition in the past at DPWW, other clubs do so and we should explore it further. We do pay honoraria to outside speakers unless they are representing a company. The current budget



was not constructed with the idea of payments to members, but there is some flexibility. Bruce will follow up with the member who asked that it be considered.

A/V (*Howard Peterson*) – Howard said he is still exploring a new microphone for meetings.

Web (Bill Hoffman) — Bill Hoffman noted the addition of two new volunteers, Michael Welburn and Vaibhav Konanur. Bill said they have defined roles including on the one hand the calendar, programs and activities, and on the other working on revising the website in the context of a content management system which makes it easier to post photos and text to the website. Bill called it a work in progress. Mike Kalscheur noted that many new members have found our organization through our website. Bill is working to make it easier to join via our website, and noted that two brand-new members were on Saturday's Sawdust in Your Coffee.

Tools (Gordon Brand) – An item left over from a recent tool sale will now become one of the club's "loaner items," a Porter Cable biscuit joiner. A dial indicator for setting up power tools is also available. George noted that the sale of deceased member Jack Harkins' shop is progressing; Windy City Wood Turners is organizing it and it's likely that larger tools will be sold first, this winter, then hand tools later in the year. George is also helping.

Old Business:

a. Holiday Party – George Rogers George noted that the attendees had a good time and that the setting at the restaurant worked out well. He also said he's heard some concerns about the cost. The board reviewed other years' versions of the holiday party, from a straight-out potluck dinner to a meeting with a presentation followed by deserts. The Fox Valley club has tried various formats, including a very inexpensive pizza dinner. There were comments that the cost of eating anywhere where the food was as good as at Reserve 22 has to be, in general, as much or more than the \$45 per person (including taxes and tip) we paid in 2024. Mark said he wondered if the tradition of suggesting that people who brought guests consider making a gift for spouses or significant others was a disincentive for attendance. There was no consensus whether it was or

was not. George will solicit input from other members on how to increase attendance at the party.

Some ideas:

- Having a less formal party, more like our summer picnic. Possibly a catered food such as pizza supplemented by potluck dishes.
- Have a party at a less formal restaurant/bar. Members would order their own food and drink and pay for it themselves.
- Have a party that's part of a general meeting. Have a presentation that would appeal to both members and spouses.
- b. Service Award In *Jeff Kramer's* absence, Bruce recounted the meeting of the committee which had been summarized and sent to the board. The Service Award was considered a big "thank you" to someone who has made a consistent contribution over a long period of time or contributed something unique over a shorter period of time. The award could be accompanied by a certificate or plaque and a club-logo'd item such as a mug or drinking cup. The committee also suggested that the current Life Member Award be changed to Honorary Life Member Award and that such memberships be limited to a finite number, probably about ten.

There was discussion about all of these items and suggestions, and the committee was asked to reconvene to refine their recommendations.

c. **Past Activities** – *Ed Buhot's* earlier presentation of string inlays was praised. Ed prepared instructional notes on the process that will be shared in a future newsletter or our web site.

New Business:

a. *Mike Kalscheur* asked if we will continue to to stream our live meetings on Zoom in 2025, since only about 5-10 members tune in. *Bill Hoffman* said, tongue in cheek, "We've discovered all the problems we can have," so we can deal with them, and it's not terribly hard to continue this service to our members. There are some members that can't physically attend the meetings and Zoom allows them to join the meeting from home. The consensus of the board was to continue to offer Zoom meetings.


January 2025 Meeting – Making Splined Boxes **Bruce Metzdorf, Program Director**

Planning and Conducting a Workshop

When planning for the workshop I would recommend:

- Outline what needs to be discussed.
 - Think about what needs to be experienced in your shop so the attendees will leave with complete enough information to transfer what they have seen to their shop.
- Example: For the String Workshop attendees needed to know how to create channels for the string.
 Address the selection of materials and source for the string. And creating and adding the string to the project.
 - A 2 to 2 ½ hour workshop with activities requires planning.
- Go through your points of communication (i.e. practice).
 - Discussions can easily wander off-topic, impact getting to the major points and also limit activity time
 - Ask yourself if you have enough time to present all the items and also allow for the activities.
- During the workshop:
 - Stay on track. Keep an eye on the time and remember you have activities to get to.
 - Do not allow yourself to wander off topic or spend too much time on any one activity that jeopardizes getting to all the needed activities.
 - o Once again, watch your time.
- Have everything you need for the workshop easily available.
 - It helps to have the items in presentation order.

Be willing to say -

- We will see that in a few minutes.
- I've never tried it. Sounds like a good idea.
 - That's interesting, let's talk about it after the workshop

I opened the shop 15 minutes before (9:15 AM) the scheduled workshop time so that the coffee and donuts could be enjoyed, and we could jump into the workshop at 9:30 am. That seemed to work for me.


Borrow DPWW Tools


